Team Updates BYLAWS AND STANDING RULES <u>TEAM</u>

Here is an update from your Colorado State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules Team. Our governing documents have been updated to comply with the changes made at the International Convention in 2018. This included membership recommendations and the changing of the State Organization name from Greek to geographic (hence, "Omega State" became "Colorado State Organization"). The Colorado State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules have been approved by International in December 2019. The BSR Team just finished the Standing Rules Appendices which are on hold until the membership can vote on them. These Appendices are also on the Colorado State Organization website for your information.

Incoming officers for the 2020-2022 biennium, should have the most current governing documents: 2019 International Constitution and Standing Rules (can download from the International website); International Go To Guide (available from International's website); 2019 Colorado State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules (available on the Colorado State Organization website or by contacting the BSR Team). Now that these newest governing documents are with us, chapters should delete or shred their older documents !! Chapters wanting to update their Chapter Rules need look no further than the template that is on the Colorado State Organization website, under the Bylaws and Standing Rules tab. Members of the Colorado State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules Team are always available to assist chapters with their governing documents.

The changes wrought on education by the pandemic have caught the interest of the BSR Team as well as our DKG members. It would be interesting to hear what recommendations come forward, especially from the Educational Excellence Team. Perhaps round table discussions by interest levels could be had. This is a call for our society to step forward and make a difference in these times.

- idea sharing on ways to entice new members and
- what to do once the new members have joined the chapter.

On the third question we were given, "What can your team contribute to meeting the challenges of reopening schools, etc.?"

Since our team's main concern is increasing membership, we could offer ways to volunteer and mentor new and seasoned teachers in the various tasks they must do to teach children.

Lastly, teachers are facing challenges of dealing with:

- decreased funding
- social distancing in the classroom space, materials, equipment, etc.
- use of technology and being sure that all students have access to materials (computers, internet service, etc.)
- parent and student fears about getting the coronavirus and precautions that are taking place to insure a clean germ-free environment.
- Plus, all the content and preparation needed to teach children.

Ideas circulating in the community

include timely pieces written by the superintendent about the start of school and the procedures that will need to take place for school to open in the pandemic. The local newspaper carries articles about the school district issues and ways they are trying to solve problems.

EDUCATIONAL LAW & POLICY/US FORUM TEAM

Educational Law and Policy

At our last meeting the ELP/US Forum Team discussed two Colorado state tax initiatives being circulated this spring and summer. Petitions to get these proposals on the state ballot must have the required number of valid signatures of 124,632 by August 3, 2020. The DKG Colorado Organization has taken a position of neutrality when it comes to controversies, legislation, ballot initiatives and measures. When presenting educational information about a particular issue, both pros and cons will be presented. Then it is then up to the individual to make a personal decision on what they support and advocate for. The two tax initiatives are Colorado Graduated Income Tax (Colorado Fair Tax) (Initiative #271) and the Colorado Decrease Income Tax from 4.63% to 4.55 % (Initiative # 306). Since they have not been approved for the ballot, we did not make pro/con statements to share with you but we are providing some information about each for your consideration. Further information about the ballot initiatives is available at www.ballotpedia.org or at individual websites. Read before you sign!!

Thumbnail sketch of the two ballot initiatives:

<u>Colorado Graduated Income Tax</u> (Colorado Fair Tax) Initiative #271: Provisions: Repeal the flat tax and create a graduated income tax rate.

- Decreased from 4.63% to 4.5% for income up to \$250,000;
- Increased from 4.63% to 7% for income from \$250,001-\$500,00;
- Increased from 4.63% to 7.75 % for income from, \$500.001-\$1,000,000; and
- Increased from 4.63% to 8.9% for income over \$1,000,000.

Proposes to raise additional state revenue up to \$2 billion each year. 50% of the revenue raised will be used for increasing pay for public pre-school through twelfth grade teachers and student support staff. The other 50% will be spent on other critical needs including affordable housing, healthcare, road repairs and maintenance and community colleges. (The impacts of a growing population and economy.) The ballot measure requires the creation of a citizen's oversight committee to assure that the additional revenue is used as required and a tax review commission to report the effects of the income tax structure on or before 2031.

Colorado Decrease Income Tax Rate from 4.63% to 4.55% Initiative #306: Provision:

Changes the Colorado Revised Statutes to reduce the state income tax rate from 4.63% to 4.55%.

US Forum

At the urging of several of our Colorado DKG Organizational leaders past and present, the Educational Law and Policy (ELP) and US Forum Team sprung into action in mid-April, 2020. The ELP/US Forum Team members include: Dr. Barbara Whinery, Team Leader, Kathy Hall, US Forum Leader, Shirley Simpson, Maggie Hunt, Nancy Pierce and Ex-Officio members: Leila Koenig, President and Suzanne Foster, First Vice President. We strongly felt it would be important to look at the impact of the pandemic on education and how we as an organization could have our voices heard on those important issues. Since mid-April we have been meeting via Zoom to gather information and prioritize the issues we would investigate.

The ELP/US Forum Team is a combined team that works collaboratively together. Educational Law and Policy follows issues at the state level and the US Forum follows legislation at the national level. Dr. Barb Whiney takes the lead with the team when we are focused on state issues and Kathy Hall takes the lead and shares issues identified by the US Forum on at the national level.

The first task we had was to complete an Embracing Diversity Survey sent to us by the US Forum in preparation for the 2020 **DKG International Convention** presentation in July. The survey asked us to explain what Diversity meant to us, identify current issues regarding diversity that are of concern to our members and to identify what initiatives were being undertaken by the state and chapters. There will be a presentation sponsored by the US Forum at the Convention that will shed more light on the issue of Embracing Diversity and areas that we need to examine. (July 9, Thursday at 1:30 p.m.) The diversity issues of concern we identified were school funding, digital learning gap, mental health (students, teacher, and parents), re-opening schools in the fall and the teacher shortage. We will share this

information with you at our upcoming state summer Leadership Conference in August.

As the pandemic lingered on, the more we struggled with where to start with numerous issues that we had identified for the US Forum. We prioritized our list and studied related concerns. After much discussion we decided to focus on the issue of re-opening of the schools in the fall. We then developed a list of several areas each of us would follow. The list includes: student/teacher and staff health and safety, expectations from CDE and school districts opening guidelines, online instruction and its impact on learning (access and equity), planning and coordinating learning activities, special education and finance/policy issues. The team has been following a variety of resources from the Colorado State Legislature, Colorado Department of Education, organizational newsletters, NEA, CEA, individual school districts, webinars, US Forum and the Governor's office to collect data. make observations and read reports related to these areas.

The team plans to share its findings on a variety of issues associated with the impact of Covid-19 on education generally and specifically on the reopening of schools in the fall at the upcoming summer Leadership Conference. We will summarize our findings, provide resources and activities for the state and chapters.

Read Any Good Books Lately?

Killers of the Flower Moon; the Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI

In the 1920s, the Osage people lived on one of the least productive pieces of land in Oklahoma. That was until oil was discovered. With this discovery the

people became wealthy. They owned mansions, were chauffeured in high dollar automobiles, and living the good life. While the Osage people reveled in their new wealth, others were watching. The watchers wanted the wealth for themselves. Then the people began to die. Suspicions started to build with the deaths of members of Mollie Burkhart's family. Her sister was shot and other relatives were shot and poisoned. Mollie herself felt unwell. The FBI was called in to investigate in the person of Tom White. White and his investigators discovered a conspiracy that involved many officials in the area. Men were going to great lengths to acquire the wealth of the Osage people for themselves.

David Grann has investigated these crimes extensively. He dug into FBI files, viewed secret grand jury testimony, read court transcripts, and spoke to several of the relatives of the murder victims. While this book is nonfiction, it reads like a novel. Full of suspense and based on true events, this book is highly recommended. I give it FIVE STARS.
