Team Updates BYLAWS AND STANDING RULES <u>TEAM</u>

Happy New Year! Hope everyone spent quality time with family and friends over the holidays. The BSR Team met at True Morgan's home in November to review chapter rules that had ben turned in from chapters as well as discuss upcoming proposed amendments to the Colorado State Organization's governing documents. The Scholarship Team has a proposal regarding the Lifelong Learning Scholarship.

The gist of their proposal is to simplify the application process for the Lifelong Learning Scholarship. The Scholarship Team met by Zoom and proposed to add wording to our documents to allow State Elected and Appointed Personnel to waive the requirement for letters of recommendation when applying to attend a State or International Conference or Convention. The rationale is to simplify the application process. Also State Elected and Appointed Personnel are well known to the Scholarship Team and the learning that State Officers and Appointed Personnel gain at these events will benefit the DKG Colorado State Organization. The

document these changes would apply to is the Colorado State Organization Appendices. page 6, under H **"REQUIREMENTS AND GUIDELINES** FOR OMEGA STATE LIFELONG LEARNING SCHOLARSHIPS"...#7. "The application and three (3) letters of recommendation must be postmarked three (3) weeks prior to the start of the program". It was suggested to add to that statement "that in the case of State Elected and Appointed applying to attend a Colorado State or International Convention or Conference the (3) letters of recommendation are not required". Our BSR Team did discuss this a little at our November meeting in that the funds are available and self sustaining in regards to the Lifelong Learning Scholarships. In addition, any proposals for changes in our governing documents, if not given prior notice in the Colorado Peaks and plains, can be brought to the floor at the Spring Executive Board meeting but will need a 2/3 vote to pass. I am planning on attending the Spring Executive Board meeting at the Franciscan Center on March 19th. I believe the call went out in the last few days. Additionally the BSR Team needs to update the chapter rules template on the State Organization website and prepare for a Bylaws "101" at the State Leadership conference in Sterling, CO. June 6, 7, 8. And, of course, the BSR Team is happy to review chapter rules submitted from chapters as this the year for that process!

A name change would cause all of our symbols, bank accounts, ceremonies, and much more to be thrown out and your chapter would have to bear the cost of providing the new items. That cost would close most chapters. All members attending the International Convention will be allowed to vote on each item presented. That is WHY you are needed there. Remembering Joan Shoemaker (1932 - 2022) By Kathy Flynn



Doris Joan Shoemaker was a 40+ member of Colorado's Omega State Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Joan joined Theta chapter in

Sterling and was there until she and George retired and moved to Estes Park. Joan was a visionary and laid out plans for new directions, new beginnings, and went about creating what she envisioned. Joan was an encourager. Often times she would encourage new members of Colorado's Omega State to attend state conventions and "soak up" all the forward thinking ideas they could grasp. "You'll come back to your chapter changed and with a new energy to help make your chapter a contributor to the schools and community in your district." She also encouraged members to attend regional conferences and International conventions because she had experienced presentations of many fantastic speakers and keynote speeches. For many years, DKG conventions, etc. became George and Joan's vacations.

Joan was born November 3, 1932, in Creston, Iowa, into a family of ten children of which she was the youngest. Her parents were Charles and Bertha Johannes. Joan was graduated from high school in 1950 in Creston, Iowa, In November of 1950 she married her husband of 69 years, George E. Shoemaker. They had three children, a boy, Greg, and two girls, Jeanette and Linda. The family moved to Sterling, Colorado where George managed an insurance firm. Joan completed the twoyear program at Northeastern Jr. College. Then Joan was graduated from CSU, Fort Collins with a Bachelor Degree with Honors. She then earned her first Masters Degree in Reading and later earned a Masters Degree in Library Science from DU. She taught junior high school for many years, then went on to be librarian for Sterling High School until she retired. George and Joan had 14

grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. They were active members of the Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies. Joan was a Deaconess and served where needed.

To say that Joan enjoyed Delta Kappa Gamma Society International wold be an understatement. Joan "loved" being a member and serving at all levels of the Society. She was chapter president in Sterling, state president Omega State Organization, served on five international committees and served as Southwest Regional Director from 1996-98, directing the 1997 Southwest Regional held in Salt Lake City. The theme for that regional conference was "Create Tomorrow." Again, she reveled in meeting members from all over the world at the international conferences and conventions. Joan promoted the state organization and worked hard to grow our membership. One of her first duties as state president was to assist Eleanor Wheat, the previous state president and Ruth Klein, executive secretary, to host the 1987 Southwest Regional Conference in Denver. Joan was state president in 1986 when Omega State celebrated their 50 year anniversary and her theme for the conference was "Golden Visions from the Mountain Top." The convention was in Fort Collins. To go along with her chosen theme, Joan asked Gwen Yocum, a composer in DKG, to write a song following the theme. Gwen wrote "Top of the Mountain" with these inspiring words;

"There are many who've been on top of the mountain, there are many who'll help you get there. There are many who want you to be on top of the mountain, for there are many who care.

You are never sad on the top of the mountain, there is beauty abounding there.

You are never alone on the top of the mountain, for God is everywhere!"

Joan and Gail Fray founded the Estes Park Chapter in 1992.

Do you like action and adventure in your books? Are you entranced by reading descriptions of scenic vistas and of beautiful wildlife? Do you want to know more about how game wardens do their jobs? If so, the Joe Pickett series by C. J. Box may be just the series for you. Joe Pickett is the game warden for the Saddle String area of Wyoming. Joe has a beautiful wife named Mary Beth and two daughters; Sheridan and Lucy. While Joe does his duties as the game warden for his area, he always manages to stumble onto all sorts of murder and mayhem. Joe is a faithful and dogged investigator with a pronounced sense of right and wrong. When he sees something wrong, he works until he is able to make it right. Joe even arrested the (fictional) governor of Wyoming once for illegally fishing!

In the first novel, Joe's daughter, Sheridan, tells her parents that she has seen a monster in the front yard. That same morning Joe finds the body of a local hunting guide in the front yard. When he investigates, he finds that the man has been murdered and now Joe wants to know why. The trail leads to more murders, an endangered species, government corruption, and danger for Joe and his family.

Box has written a series that is engaging and interesting. The main characters are likable and Joe's sense of right and wrong is endearing. Warning: There is some blue language and some sexual content. With that being said, I recommend this series and I eagerly await each new book.
